

## Village Building Going Up at Ovid

OVID, June 13—A new municipal building for this little village of 650 inhabitants is nearing completion.

The two-story building under construction in Main Street by Brown-Hoyt Co., Canandaigua, general contractors, is being built at a cost of more than \$315,000 and is the gift to the village of Walter B. Ford, retired college mathematics instructor and Mrs. Ford of the Cayuga Lake Boulevard, east of here.

### 4 Pink Sides

The front and two sides of the new building will be pink limestone and the rear will be in matching pink brick. The building is being erected on the site of the former Presbyterian Church that was dismantled five years ago because of the deteriorated condition of the structure.

A lobby in the front will be of marble with a marble stairway leading to the second floor. Glazed tile will be used from floor to ceiling in the quarters that will house the fire apparatus and fire trucks.

A garage to house the village trucks will be separate from one for volunteer fire department trucks.

The building will have a room

for village records, a separate room for the town's records, an office for the fire chief, mayor, as well as meeting rooms, kitchen and lounge.

### Tower With Clock

A tall memorial tower, 30 feet high and nine feet wide, will grace the front of the municipal building that was designed by John R. Ehrlich, Geneva architect. There will be a clock on the upper portion of the tower. The tower will be lighted inside with ornamental glass lights.

General construction work on the building has been under way since last August. A dedication ceremony is planned when the building is completed and ready for occupancy in the early fall.

An alumnus of Harvard University, where he received A.B. and Ph.D. degrees, Ford taught mathematics for many years at the University of Michigan. He has been retired since 1940 when he and Mrs. Ford, a native of Ovid, built a new stone home on a bluff overlooking Cayuga Lake.

A contributor to the new Taylor-Brown Memorial Hospital in Waterloo, Ford is a member of the board of trustees of that institution.

## Plastic Bag Warning Spread in 3 Counties

NEWARK, June 13—Action to prevent disaster before it happens was taken by Wayne-Seneca-Ontario dry cleaners when they voted to use labels on plastic bags warning they are potentially dangerous to children.

The area dry cleaners' group took the action at their monthly dinner meeting held at the Belhurst in Geneva. It was brought out that apparently the thin plastic material develops an electro-static charge due to friction from handling which tenaciously clings to the face and mouth of a child, threatening suffocation.

The bag should be destroyed, it was pointed out, or discarded as soon as it has served its intended purpose.

Of the 53 deaths reported in the country, it was disclosed, three were in New York City, but none in this area.

SENECA FALLS, June 13—Monday will mark the closing of the American Railway Express Company's Seneca Falls office in State Street and the consolidation of its facilities with the Geneva agency.

The closing of the local agency, that also has served Waterloo, at this time, according to the Company's district sales manager, David Weiner, was prompted by the retirement of Floyd Olmstead, agent at the Seneca Falls office for 37 years. An enterprise telephone number will be listed and patrons may call the Geneva office without charge. Weiner emphasized the new service will be "as adequate or more so under the new setup."

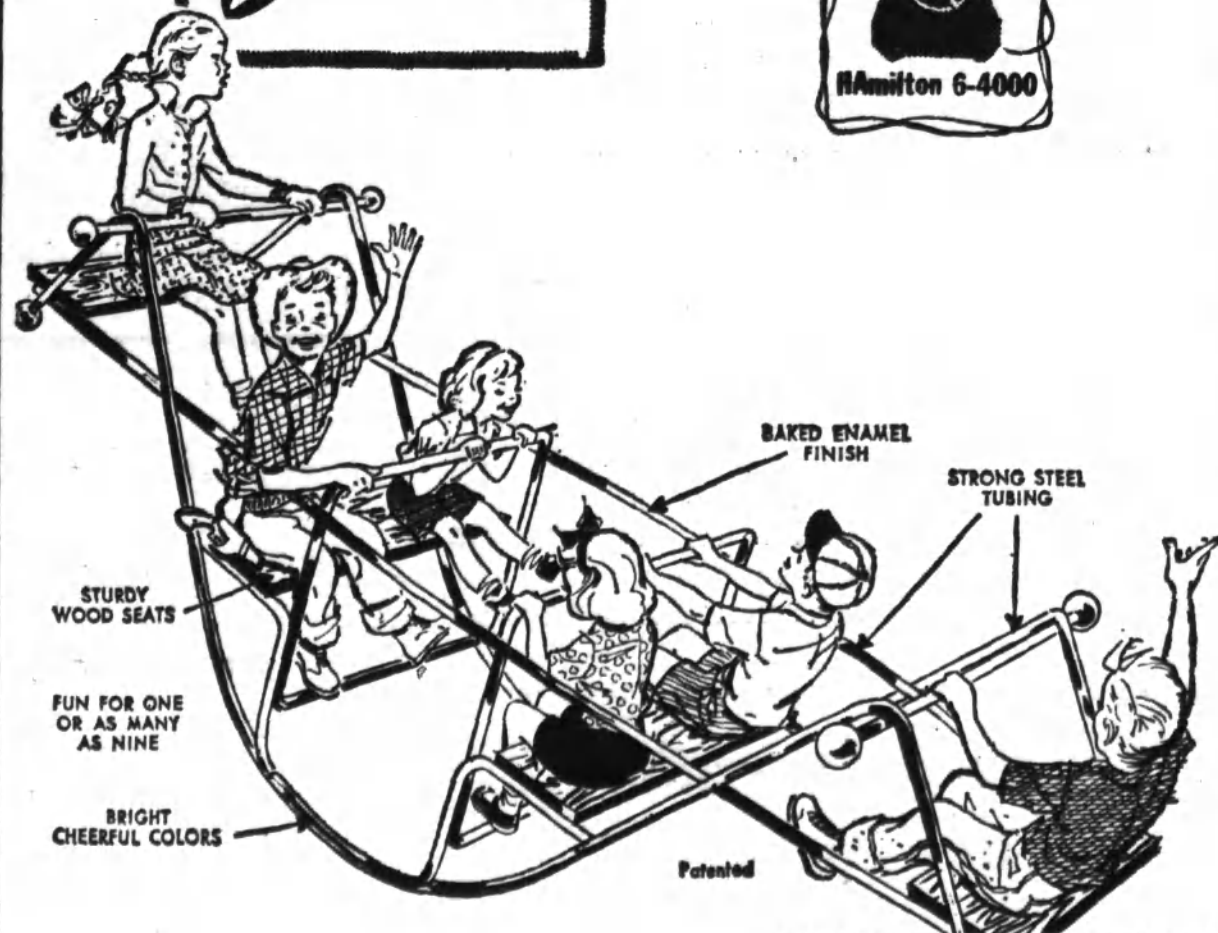

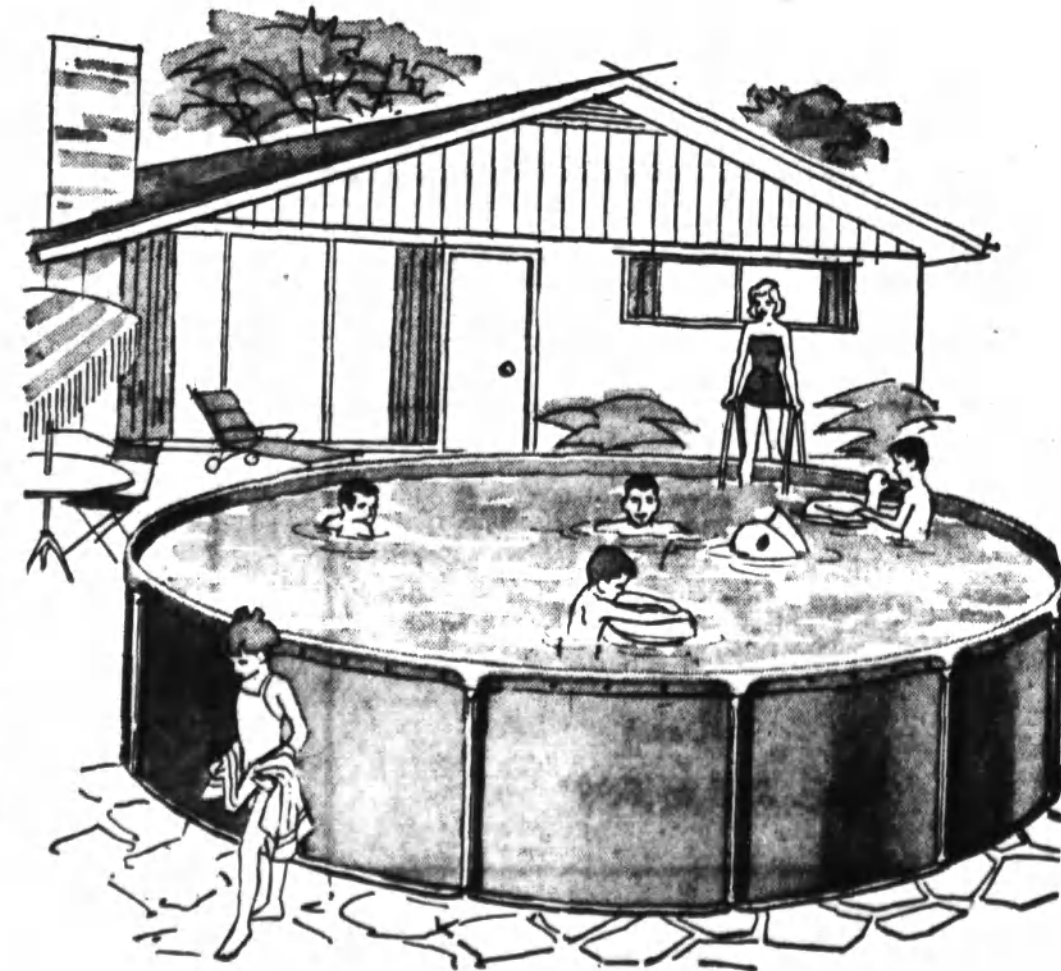

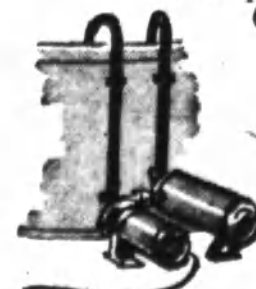
